Are kosher foods healthier?

Keeping kosher isn't just a matter of religion lately. Many shoppers are buying kosher foods because they think kosher is safer and healthier.

According to a survey by market research firm Mintel, 51 percent of people who buy kosher foods, which are prepared according to dietary and processing codes under traditional Jewish practice, do so for the "general healthfulness" of such foods. About one-third buy kosher because they believe food safety standards are higher than standards of regular supermarket foods. Just 15 percent of respondents say they purchase kosher foods because of religious beliefs. The New York Times has reported that sales of kosher foods hit \$12.5 billion in 2008, an increase from 2003 of 64 percent. Nutrition experts point out that kosher food practices were created for religious reasons, and there's no evidence that kosher food is healthier or safer than any other kind.

Safety Tips for Driving Alone

- Don't engage in road rage. Back away or exit the area instead of confronting an angry driver.
- Pay attention: Be aware of your surroundings and who is there. Keep your doors locked while driving, be aware of emergency vehicles and people walking in the streets. Car jackers rely on the element of surprise.
- Park in well lit and populated areas. Ask for an escort to your car and have your keys out and ready. If you have a panic button on your keys, know how to use it. Don't approach you vehicle if there is a suspicious vehicle near yours, like large SUVs or vans.
- Don't assume that all flashing lights are law enforcement. If the vehicle that is attempting to pull you over doesn't look official, don't pull over until you get to a populated area. Angle your car so you can pull away quickly if necessary. Crack your window to talk to them; don't get out of the car. Ask to see ID, and observe their demeanor and dress. If anything looks out of the ordinary, pull away and call 911.

Teriyaki Chicken Pineapple Stuffed Bell Peppers

1 cup water

1/2 cup rice

1 boneless skinless chicken breast diced into small cubes

2 tablespoons olive oil

1/2 cup canned pineapple tidbits drained


1/2 cup teriyaki sauce, do not use the thick glaze sauce

2 bell peppers cut in half lengthwise and seeded

1/2 cup shredded mozzarella or cheddar cheese

Sliced green onion and sesame seeds (optional)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.




In a hot frying pan add olive oil. Heat oil then add chicken. Stir and cook chicken until brown. Add the teriyaki sauce and simmer until teriyaki sauce is reduced by half. Add the pineapple and continue stirring for 2 minutes. Add the rice and stir to combine. Then add the cheese and stir to combine.

Place bell peppers in a baking dish. Fill peppers with chicken mixture. Cover with foil and place in oven. Bake for 50 minutes or until peppers are tender.

Garnish with a few pineapple tidbits, green onions and sesame seeds. Enjoy

Your Nose Knows: Six Vehicle Warning Signs You Can Smell

Most vehicles start out with a "new car smell," but there are other specific odors that motorists should never ignore. Identifying these suspect smells early on can help car owners be car care aware and avoid the hassle and expense of an unexpected breakdown, says the Car Care Council.

"Unusual smells can be the sign of serious, and potentially costly, trouble for your vehicle. By acting quickly and making necessary repairs, you'll be able to breathe easy knowing there is no harmful damage to your car," said Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council.

The Car Care Council recommends a sniff test of your vehicle to identify any unusual smells, including the following six warning signs:

- 1) The smell of burnt rubber could be slipping drive belts or misplaced loose hoses that might be rubbing against rotating accessory drive pulleys. Do not reach in if the engine compartment is hot.
- 2) The smell of hot oil could mean that oil is leaking onto the exhaust system. To verify the leak, look for oil on the pavement or smoke coming from the engine area.
- 3) The smell of gasoline is likely the sign of a gas leak in some area of the vehicle such as a fuel injector line or the fuel tank. Any smell of fuel can result in a possible fire hazard, so immediate attention should be given.
- 4) The sweet smell of syrup may be a sign that your car is leaking engine coolant from a leaky component related to the car's cooling system. Do not open the radiator cap when it is hot.
- 5) The smell of burning carpet could be a sign of brake trouble and a safety hazard. Have your brakes checked right away, especially if this smell is happening during normal driving conditions.
- 6) The smell of rotten eggs is never a good one and, if you smell it coming from your vehicle, it could mean a problem with your catalytic converter. This smell can also be attributed to a poor running engine, causing the catalytic converter to become overloaded and fail due to meltdown.
